Human Rights In India

Human rights are the basic rights available to any human being by virtue of his birth in human race. It is inherent in all human beings irrespective of their nationality, religion, language, sex, colour or any other consideration. The Protection of Human Rights Act, 1993 defines Human Rights as: "human rights" means the rights relating to life, liberty, equality and dignity of the individual guaranteed by the Constitution or embodied in the International Covenants and enforceable by courts in India".

India had signed the Universal Declaration on Human Rights January 01, 1942. Part III of the Constitution India 'also referred as magna carta' contains the Fundamental rights. These are the rights which are directly enforceable against the state in case of any violation. Article 13(2) prohibits state from making any law in violation of the Fundamental Rights. It always provides that if a part of law made is against the Fundamental Rights, that part would be declared as void. If the void part cannot be separated from the main act, the whole act may be declared as void.

Universal Declaration of Human Rights

Universal Declaration of Human Rights was proclaimed as "a common standard of achievements for all people and all nations." It sets out fundamental human rights to be universally protected. It consists of a preamble and 30 articles. 30 Basic human Rights include:

Article 2 Freedom from Discrimination

Article 3 Right to Life, Liberty, Personal Security

Article 4 Freedom from Slavery

Article 5 Freedom from Torture and Degrading Treatment

Article 6 Right to Recognition as a Person before the Law

Article 8 Right to Remedy by Competent Tribunal

Article 9 Freedom from Arbitrary Arrest and Exile

Article 10 Right to Fair Public Hearing

Article 11 Right to be Considered Innocent until Proven Guilty

Article 12 Freedom from Interference with Privacy, Family, Home and Correspondence

Article 13 Right to Free Movement in and out of the Country

Article 14 Right to Asylum in other Countries from Persecution

Article 15 Right to a Nationality and the Freedom to Change It

Article 16 Right to Marriage and Family

Article 17 Right to Own Property

Article 18 Freedom of Belief and Religion

Article 19 Freedom of Opinion and Information

Article 20 Right of Peaceful Assembly and Association

Article 21 Right to Participate in Government and in Free Elections

Article 22 Right to Social Security

Article 23 Right to Desirable Work and to Join Trade Unions

Article 24 Right to Rest and Leisure Article 25 Right to Adequate Living Standard Article 26 Right to Education

Article 27 Right to Participate in the Cultural Life of Community

An **Event Manager** is a skilled and qualified professional who is in charge of coordinating an entire event that is scheduled for various kinds of occassions starting from business conferences to birthday parties. **Event Managers** are responsible for taking care of finances that are allotted for a particular event, as well as taking care of guests who come for the event and finally the food and catering department. In short, Event Managers are the go to people for any sort of events.

Types of Event Managers

Event Managers can be differentiated on the type of work they do. Event Managers find themselves employed in various industries. As such their job titles change too accordingly. The types of Event Managers according to the profession are as below.

There are various types of Event Managers on the basis of profession. They have been mentioned below in a detailed manner.

- Wedding Planner: As the name says, Wedding Planners are hired to plan and organize weddings. They take care of catering, decoration, guest lists and appointments for the bride and groom. They do all of this within a set budget. India's wedding industry is the biggest in the world, estimated at USD 50 billion, as per a report by KPMG.
- **Event Coordinator:** An Event Coordinator makes sure all individual gears of an event are well oiled and functioning. Their duty is to ensure all details are being executed as planned by an Event Planner. They are less involved with the design and planning aspect of events and more to do with direction and scheduling.
- **Event Planner:** Event Planners as described above takes care of the planning aspect of the event. They handle the who, what, how and where of events. They are involved in the pre-event process. Their duty responsibilities are more creative as they take care of the theme and design of events.
- **Director of Events:** The Director of Events is the person on top who takes all major decisions. They decide how many people are going to attend the event, the goal of the event and also the budget. Location, logistics, vendors, catering etc are handled by them. In short, they handle all the details of an Event Manager, Event Planner and Event Coordinator together.

Eligibility

- Must pass class XII with 50 % marks for doing graduation, Post graduation, Diplomas or PG Diplomas and Certificate in Event Management.
- Admission to PGDM and PGPM program is done on the basis of National level entrance exam such as CAT, MAT etc.

9-January: Pravasi Bharatiya Divas (NRI Day)

Why &When: is a celebratory day observed (starting in 2003) on 9 January by the Republic of India to mark the contribution of the overseas Indian community towards the development of India. The day commemorates the return of Mahatma Gandhi from South Africa to Mumbai on 9 January 1915.

10-January: World Hindi Day

Why &When-World Hindi Day: To emphasize the Hindi language which Is one of the oldest and widely spoken languages in India. World Hindi Day

or Vishwa Hindi Divas is celebrated every year on January 10 to mark the first World Hindi Conference that was held in 1975. It is celebrated across

the world to promote the use of the Hindi language. The first World Hindi Conference was held in Nagpur on January 10 in 1975.

11-January: National Road safety week

Why &When: Road Safety Week is celebrated from January 11 to January 17 every year. Organised by the Ministry of Road Transport and Highways, it intends to spread awareness on the importance of road safety, which is a major health concern for authorities and the government.

12-January: National Youth Day

Why &When: National Youth Day, also known as Vivekananda Jayanti, is celebrated on 12 January, being the birthday of Swami Vivekananda. In 1984 the Government of India declared this day as National Youth Day and since 1985 the event is celebrated in India every year.

14-January: Armed forces veteran day

Why &When: India, the Armed Forces Veterans Day is observed each year on 14 January since 2017. The day aims to acknowledge and honour the selfless devotion and sacrifice of our veterans in the service of the nation.

19-January: National Immunization Day (Polio Day),

Why &When-National Immunization Day (Polio Day): Poliovirus, which is now endemic in India to prevent children from contracting with poliovirus vaccine drive is conducted every year on this day

24-January: National Girl Child Day

Why &When-National Girl Child Day: The National Girl Child Day is celebrated in India every year on January 24. It was initiated in 2008 by the Ministry of Women and Child Development and the government of India, to spread public awareness about inequities that girls face in Indian society. The day is celebrated with organized programs including awareness campaigns about Save the Girl Child, child sex ratios, and the creation of a healthy and safe environment for girls. Inequalities, gender issues and low-level treatment that every girl faces in Indian society to raise awareness among people about all the above issues.
